Dr Mensa Otabil



Bishop Bismark is an Apostle to the nations. He has served as apostolic covering for ministries all over the world since 1989. He serves as the Chairman of the CAA, a wholly African initiative to bring the apostolic voice of the African church to African Issues.

Bishop Bismark has a passion for the empowerment of people and the realization of their God-ordained destiny. He travels extensively, preaching, teaching and empowering the Body of Christ all over the world.
